6. **ADMINISTRATIVE ENQUIRIES**

Director, Ross Potter – There was a fire concern between Enterprise and Hay River – 5kms outside Paradise Gardens. Teams placed sprinklers in Riverwoods and Paradise. IC & ENR in charge of the operation, with the Hay River Fire Dept as back up. We had a meeting this afternoon with TURK planning a worst case scenario plan, if needed to evacuate 3500

people. 737's & Hurcs can fly into our airport no problem. Roads going out of town are not good. We have the availability to house people in Hay River if needed on a Territorial level. We can use schools, treatment centre, rec centre as a last resort. There is a good handle on things.

In June of 2001 Council approved a Land Sales Incentive Program. This program has been renewed annually with the 10% deposit applying to all lots for sale in Town.

The guidelines for this program were as follows:

- The Land Sales Incentive Program shall apply to all land sales in the Town of Hay River
- Purchaser pays a 10% nonrefundable deposit on land
- Upon acceptance of their application the purchaser gets "possession" of the land, which gives them the right to develop
- Purchaser pays property taxes on the land from date of possession
- Purchaser has up to 12 months from the date of acceptance of their application to pay for the land plus GST (less deposit) interest free
- Upon final payment the Town will transfer title to the purchaser subject to the development conditions outlined in the Land Administration Bylaw No. 2178 & 2178A and the Agreement for Sale.
- If payment for the land is not received within the 12 months period the land reverts to the Town plus all related improvements, the 10% deposit is not refunded
- A new Land Application was developed in 2002 to be used in conjunction with the Land Sales Incentive Program
- For new land sales only



b) Sale of Lots Through Auction & Ballot Draw

Council accepts the report entitled sale of lots through auction and ballot draw as presented.

BACKGROUND:

Within the past year Council has identified a number of lots for sale, and in most instances obtained independent assessments to help determine the value at which they would be sold.

The supported method of disposition for the lots was as follows:

- Through auction with a reserve bid – 1 Commercial lot
- Through ballot draw process, fixed price – 7 Residential & 5 Industrial lots.

A public meeting was held on June 25, 2015 to dispose of these lots. The outcome was the sale of the Commercial lot at the reserve bid, with 5 Residential lots in the West Channel area sold at the fixed price, plus GST. Gross proceeds from these 6 lots before GST, is \$247,400. An initial 10% deposit has been collected from all purchasers, with a further 20% to be collected on the Commercial lot.

The remaining 7 lots will be sold on a first come first serve basis at the fixed price, plus GST. The total fixed price of these remaining lots is \$270,728, before GST.

Various associated documents and processes have been initiated by Administration to facilitate the timely completion of these sales and the subsequent development of the respective properties. The purchasers are required to develop the properties with specified time frames, as provided for within By-law No. 2178A.



The Hay River Fire Department is a combined service handling both fire and ambulance responses. Our response area leads from Hay River to the Alberta/NWT Border, Hay River to Ft. Resolution, Hay River to ½ way to Ft. Smith, Hay River to ½ way to Ft Simpson, Hay River to Ft. Providence the largest response area of any Fire Department/Ambulance service in the NWT. Our members are trained with S1100 Vehicle Extrication Training and EMR or EMT status. The Department has 28 Volunteer members and 1 Full Time Chief. Vehicles responding to a motor vehicle accident will include our Highway Rescue Truck c/w Heavy Hydraulic Tools, High and Low Pressure Air Bags, Stabilization Equipment and other ancillary items. We also respond with a Type III Diesel Powered Ambulance with Defibrillator, Auto Pulse and packaging equipment. The Town has a Fire Prevention Bylaw which allows us to do out of town calls. The Fire Department has Standard Operating Guidelines which provide the guidelines of response to Fire, Rescue and Ambulance Operations. Medical SOG's are signed off by our Medical Director Dr. Bing Guthry. The HRFD has responded to 2 highway calls since January of this year.

Objective of the funding is for MACA to assist in the funding to purchase and install a new Communications Tower on the Emergency Services Building. The replacement of the old tower will increase the range of our present VHF Radio System to better cover Highway Response.



The Hay River Detachment responded to a total of 274 calls for service during the month of May, 2015, within the town of Hay River Jurisdiction.

Annual Performance Plan (A.P.P.'S) Community Priorities

Community approved APP'S are;

- (1) Organized Crime-Drug Trafficking
- (2) Substance Abuse-Alcohol and Drugs
- (3) Youth Crime Prevention
- (4) Community Policing/Aboriginal Awareness

This month the detachment addressed the Drug Trafficking by:

Continuing to gather meaningful intelligence on persons involved in the drug trade in our communities

Community Involvement: The community continues to support Hay River "Drug Free" zones.

This month the detachment addressed the issue of Substance Abuse by:

Supporting local programs encouraging those in need of substance abuse assistance.
Continuing to raise awareness regarding substance abuse with the community: Members conducted patrols in the community during community events.

Community Involvement: The communities continue to provide support services for their community members and remain supportive of the RCMP efforts.

This month the detachment was involved with youth crime prevention by:

Continuing to make contact with the youth in the Hay River, KFN and Enterprise area. Please see S/Cst. BECK's reports for these activities

Community Involvement: The community continues to provide numerous activities and positive alternatives to crime giving youth an option in lieu of negative activities.

This month the detachment was involved in Community Policing and Aboriginal Awareness by:

Community Involvement: Our communities continue to support our policing and community policing activities.

Update on work being performed by ACCP S/Cst. Beck:

S/CST BECK dealt with several diversion matters with the Hay River justice committee providing assistance and support to the clients.

Three youth were found to have stolen several bikes throughout a three week period. S/CST BECK spoke to the youth and escorted them back to the homes where the bikes were taken from. The youth gave the bikes back and apologized. S/CST BECK arranged to have two abandoned bike's release to the youth so they could each have a working bicycle.

S/CST Steve BECK had several school visits and commenced three "Take a Kid" trapping programs. The programs were put on for the Chief Sunrise School, Diamond Jenness Secondary and Ecole Boreal. Over 150 Youth participated in the 2 nights and three day spring camp activities. Multiple schools were at the camp at the same time which developed partnerships between the local schools as well with elders and police. S/CST BECK has received many positive comments from the school administrators and the general public alike with regards to the success of this year's camps. New camps are already being requested and planned for the coming months.

The camp had two live in elders and at least three staff members chaperoning the camp from all the respective schools. Many other elders and community members attended the camp for day trips and enjoyed country foods that were harvested and processed by the youth in camp. All the beaver, ducks and rabbits harvested were donated to local elders and families in need feeding over 50 families this spring.

A large injured bear was harvested and was skinned. This animal was clearly suffering and needed to be dispatched due to the pain it was in a danger to the public. This led to a conversation between S/CST BECK and Youth regarding a moral responsibility to hunt large game with proper weapons as well to pursue wounded game. The skull was blached and donated to the reserve school for anatomy lessons in future. The hide was donated to Ecole Boreal school for display and a memento of the 2015 spring camp.

Youth learned life skills while living in a traditional setting. This environment fostered many interesting conversations ranging from drug abuse to residential schools. Teachers also took advantage of the opportunity to teach their science curriculums in a hands on situation instead of from a text book.

The camp also taught many other skills dealing with natural conservation hide preparation. Many of the pelts are to be distributed throughout the NWT as welcoming mats in Kindergarten classes. S/CST BECK donated fifteen beaver pelts last year to a Kindergarten class on the

KATLODECHEE First Nations reserve and the mats have been found to calm the youth and keep their attention spans active as they take instruction from their teachers.

S/CST BECK assisted a movie producer from the West Coast that was hired to come and do an anti-bullying video with The KATLODECHEE First Nations reserve kindergarten youth. The producer was taken on the land and given a traditional experience to help him understand the culture he was working with. He felt this was necessary to properly edit his short film. The final music video produced which was launched on the reserve in front of over 100 people. This launch was attended by several detachment members and was followed by a meal put on by the youth at the Chief Sunrise School.

S/CST BECK with high school youth from Diamond Jenness high school broke and plowed the field for the 2015 annual potato project. This project will have the potatoes grown and harvested at the fall leadership program. The potatoes will be donated to the local soup kitchen. The soup kitchen is 100 percent donation run and the large donation of potatoes is always welcomed by their manager.

S/CST BECK is working on an elder appreciation day where RCMP members will cook locally caught fish and have a year ending meal between Chief Sunrise school youth and their local elders. The fish is being harvested at present and the fish fry is being set for June 25th behind Chief Sunrise School. These opportunities develop strong ties within the community and allow for partnerships to develop between community and police.

S/CST BECK did a presentation to local schools giving them insight into RCMP youth programs that are upcoming in the next few months. Schools have begun to slot in times for the next spring camp and leadership program.

Notable Occurrences for the Month:

These Occurrences took place within the overall jurisdiction of the Hay River RCMP

- On May 5th, after learning that two hunters had gone through the ice travelling to their spring hunt camp, RCMP members with the assistance of Environment and Natural Resources, flew to the location on the camp. The hunters were found alive and well having been able to salvage their supplies from the water.
 - Road safety week fell during the second week of May. Hay River members were out in force promoting safe driving. By the week end the members had written 43 tickets, 2 warnings, charged 4 distracted drivers, issued 6 24 hour suspensions, conducted two check stops, and had laid two impaired driving charges. A member also attended a local school to give an ATV safety presentation.
 - On May 3rd, A Hay River woman woke to find an intruder in her home. She managed to force the man out of her home then called the police. Members located and charged the man with breaking and entering.

Unionized Town of Hay River employees continue to strike over wages. The annual NWTAC conference was held at the KFN reserve, for which the union expressed it's intention to picket. Through careful planning and cooperation the meetings were conducted without incident, while allowing the union members a safe venue for visibility.
